#### Annual Report 2020-21

**Makom** – meaning place in Hebrew – is an inclusive community fusing Jewish tradition and progressive values through spirituality, learning and culture. Makom inspires diverse participants to explore together how Judaism can meaningfully enrich our lives.

# Online Programs

As the COVID-19 pandemic persisted through the second half of 2020 and well into 2021, Makom continued to offer a steady roster of online programs for our community. Through joyous Kabbalat Shabbat services, song-filled Havdalah ceremonies, daytime and evening Torah study classes and twice-weekly neySHEV meditation sits, we helped people connect with Judaism and each other.

Makom marked holidays together with candle lighting and activities every night of Hanukkah; a Tu bi-Shvat seder; Purim lecture, concert, party, and evening and morning Megillah readings; pre-Passover classes; Yizkor memorial services and a Tikkun Pre-Shavuot, all online.

### **Outdoor Gatherings**

In summer 2020, Makom began adding outdoor, in-person programs to our online lineup. St. Peter's Church warmly welcomed us to hold our distanced Friday night and Tishah be-Av services in their yard. After months of lockdown, it was thrilling to gather together in real life.

> As the weather turned brisk, we hiked the route of the now-buried Garrison Creek, which flows under the city, and learned about the natural, Indigenous, and urban histories of this land.



Despite the low (and ever-changing) pandemic gathering limits, we welcomed more than 200 community members to **27** different outdoor High Holiday experiences.

Over four glorious days in Christie Pits Park, we held traditional services, family services, meditation sits, Torah study, an interfaith couples' gathering, mindful chanting, and multiple shofar blowings for the broader downtown Jewish community.

#### **Connecting Families**

Through the many pandemic lockdowns, Makom families gathered together online to celebrate holidays with dedicated family programming.

> Families made spice sets for Havdalah, built Hanukkiot and lit Hanukkah candles together, planted seeds for Tu bi-Shvat, heard an abridged Purim Megillah reading accompanied by our students' illustrations, learned about and created Passover Seder plates, and made cheesecake for Shavuot.

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Rabbi Aaron personally delivered program materials, some of which were provided by UJA Federation's Unboxing Jewish project, to families. These dropoffs became opportunities to connect and check in with parents and children in person.

### Feeding the Hungry

While Makom's College Street storefront has been closed to the public during the pandemic, we have utilized our space to collaborate with local organizations and provide food for our neighbours in need.

In September 2020, a team of volunteers cooked a hot, nutritious, take-out lunch at Makom for Fort York Food Bank to distribute to 75 people experiencing hunger.



Since January 2021, Makom has been hosting Toronto Food Not Bombs. Using Makom's space to store and prepare donated food has enabled them to expand their operations significantly and to provide groceries and fresh meals to nearly 600 people in need each week.

# Makom Afterschool Flex

Although we were unable to run Makom Afterschool in our usual locations in TDSB schools due to the pandemic, we made the most of the flexibility and personalized attention possible with online learning.



Makom Afterschool Flex provided Hebrew and Jewish tutoring to students in JK through Grade 5, individually or in pairs. Students learned a lot and had fun, and their parents were highly satisfied with the model.

Makom never turns any children away from Jewish education due to lack of funds. With generous support from Makom donors and UJA Federation, we provide financial support to all who need it.



Makom ATID, our Hebrew and Jewish learning program for students in Grades 6 through 8, ran online for the 2020-2021 school year. Through in-depth text study, class discussion, and multimedia resources, eight students studied the full cycle of Jewish holidays and the entirety of Bereishit (Genesis), the first book of the Torah.

#### Interfaith Couples

On Rosh Hashanah 2020 (in person) and then online monthly since February 2021, Makom has convened gatherings for interfaith/intercultural couples to meet one another and learn about Judaism together.


#### Steps taken 2020-2021:
